

Grand re-opening in Phoenix and 1 year of wishes granted

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 20, 2002 – Domino's Pizza, the world's recognized leader in pizza delivery, today celebrated two extraordinary events in Phoenix. Domino's invited the community to take part in festivities for the grand re-opening of 79 Phoenix-area stores, as well as the first anniversary of its national partnership with the Make-A-Wish Foundation® of America.

Knotts kicked off the official ribbon-cutting ceremony, marking the largest acquisition in company history, at the 6650 West Thomas Road Domino's location in Phoenix. Arizona Secretary of State Betsey Bayless participated in the ceremony and delivered a special message proclaiming June 20th Domino's Pizza Day in the State of Arizona.

Domino's showed its dedication to the community by presenting \$75,000 to the Make-A-Wish Foundation, commemorating the first anniversary of the national partnership, which has delivered 11 wishes nationwide to date. As part of the partnership, "Domino's Delivers Incredible Wishes," Domino's sponsors and delivers wishes to 12 wish children in different cities each year, in addition to supporting chapters throughout the country with pizza donations, fundraisers and event sponsorships.

Two children from the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Central & Southern Arizona celebrated their wishes at the event. In the coming weeks, Domino's will deliver three-year-old Jessica's wish for her own playground set from Rainbow Play Systems, and 10-year-old Isaac's wish for a deluxe game room, filled with freestanding arcade games.

Paula Van Ness, President and CEO of the Make-A-Wish Foundation of America, and Rebecca Villicana, President and CEO of the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Central and Southern Arizona, joined Domino's Patrick Knotts for the ceremony. Other Domino's Pizza and Make-A-Wish team members were also in attendance, as well as representatives from Congressman Ed Pastor's office.
